

Now, don't get me wrong here, I'm no killjoy, I think it's good we can share all these things with family and friends. God wants us to enjoy his creation in all its richness. But he also wants us to remember who created it all. To celebrate creation and the creator. The trouble is, as that super market shelf reminded us, we tend to get distracted in the creation that can lead us away from God. This is nothing new. Augustine, the man using soundbites before they were even invented, said in the 5th century 'The beautiful things of this world kept me from you'.

We have to keep our eyes set firmly upon God to enjoy creation in all its richness and abundance. Easter shows us that the creator God is willing to go to any lengths to share a relationship with him. He is even willing to sacrifice himself so we can have newness of life in him, the Good News of the Easter message. The resurrection on Easter day changes everything and invites us to share a new relationship of perfect love with him.

Just as Jesus broke from the tomb on Easter day, so we too can break from the darkened tombs of our existence, from where we never fully appreciate the wonders of his creation. We can break out from our old lives that hold us back from discovering the new life to be found in Jesus Christ.

In the gathering light of that first Easter morning, when Jesus asks Mary Magdalene, why are you crying? Jesus is asking to share in all our sadness and despair and lift us up. As he calls her by name, 'Mary' he is inviting us all into a personal relationship with him, where he knows us by name. And as Mary answers Rabboni, he is inviting each of us to let him be our teacher and begin to discover the perfect love between himself the Father and the Holy Spirit, and to join in.

Give us a ring – St Nicholas Bells open evening

As part of St George's day celebrations, St Nicholas bell ringers are holding an open evening on Monday 23rd April. The event will showcase the work of the dedicated team of volunteers, and is part of a project to make St Nicholas church more accessible to the public. People will be able to see the team working close-up and even given the opportunity under supervision to ring one of the bells themselves!

Don Salisbury, who heads the team, explains, 'This exercise is being carried out so that people can come along and understand what bellringing involves. It is not intended to recruit new ringers, but if anyone expresses a desire to learn, then it can be arranged.'



Visitors will not only be given an insight into the history of the bells, some of which date back several centuries, but will be able to watch the ringers demonstrate their skills of this ancient craft and learn how they ring changes and what actually happens when the bell is pulled.

The tower bells, which are the only set in Letchworth, are a well-loved feature of Norton community life and among the most valuable parts of the church fabric. As they have done for hundreds of years, they still ring out every Sunday morning after the 8am service to announce the presence of the church and Christ in the parish.
